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We are planning to mate Elsa III vom Tecklenburgerland (Emmy) to Asco II vom Kiefernwalde. Emmy should come into season in January 2027. She is already in Germany so we do not miss her mating due to plane flight logistics. Once she is confirmed pregnant I will bring her back to my home to whelp her pups. I was very fortunate to acquire Emmy. She comes from one of the oldest and most respected KIM kennels in Germany. The breeder got his first KIM, as a teenager, in 1965 from Hermann Lons (Loens), who is credited with promoting and establishing the KIM breed. I have known her breeder for a number of years. Only because of unique special circumstances was I able to acquire her. KIM of this quality, who was fully trained and approved for breeding do not come up for sale very often and especially to buyers outside of Germany. I personally only know of 3. The breeder has been mother line breeding to refine his line for over 40 years. Emmy is a product of his dedicated work. It shows. I WILL INTRODUCE YOU TO ELSA III FIRST AND ASCO II FOLLOW BELOW ELSA III (Emmy).

Emmy was born, May 23, 2021. To give you an idea of her temperament, trainability, stability and intelligence I am going to list how she performed in her JGHV field performance tests competed before she was 2 years old.

ELSA III JGHV PERFORMANCE AWARD DESCRIPTIONS:

Btr COMPLETED 3/6/2022 She was 9 1/2 months. This was before she competed the VJP.

Description of Btr Award: *Bringtreueprüfung (Btr):* Retrieving Reliability Test: During the Btr the dog demonstrates that it is a reliable retriever by finding, picking up and delivering to its handler any cold, dead game that was found accidentally, without any influence by the handler. This test is conducted in a forested area during the months of August through April. At least two hours before the test a cold, dead fox will be carried on a circuitous route to a designated place in the forest. Once the dog is released with a SEARCH command, the handler must remain completely silent. The dog passes the test if it finds and retrieves the fox to its handler within 20 minutes of being released.

VJP (75) & AH Award COMPLETED 3/30/222 She was 10+ months old. At her VJP evaluation she received the AH award.

Description of AH Award: Armbruster Halt Award: The Armbruster Halt Award is granted when a dog demonstrates the ability to be obedient on the track of a hare during the VJP, HZP or VGP. The dog is whistled to the DOWN position when it sights a hare. After the hare is out of sight, the dog is released to track it and must demonstrate at least a GOOD track. The dog must demonstrate obedience on every hare it has seen during the test and must be 20 m from its handler at least once.

Description of HN Award: Härtenachweis (HN): The Toughness Certificate is awarded when a dog demonstrates that it is fearless and able when confronted with furred predators or feral game during a hunting situation. An independent witness must observe this occurrence and provide documentation of the event to the Group Breed Warden.

Elsa III (Emmy) SHORT STORY::

I traveled to Germany to pick Emmy up Mid February of 2023. The owner was on vacation. He emailed me the commands he used when training her before I arrived in Germany and Heiko helped me overcome my American accent and pronounce the German commands correctly...so I sounded like a German, at least when using those commands.

The Breeder clued me in by telling me, "This is a dog that you will not stop and casually talk to your neighbor." He left it at that. I know him well enough I knew exactly what he was telling me. By the time I had worked with her the first time there was no question his description was correct! She is very focused on the task in the field.

The pup is 6 months and 3 weeks old. The duck search was done right after the blind retrieve. The person laying the drag stayed kind of visible to provide the distraction that might occur at a the HZP field evaluation and also to see if the pup would focused on completing the task. She investigated the person and then went back to her task and completed it.

OVERVIEW OF Emmy's Litter, 2024:

The litter was 10 puppies in size, 6 females and 3 males. All 10 of the puppies in this litter were evaluated through the JGHV breed qualifying field performance evaluations (VJP & HZP).

STATISTICS:

Field Performance Evaluations:

VJP (Spring Natural Ability Puppy Test) All 10 completed with an average score of 72.

HZP (Fall Breed Test, advanced Natural Ability Test) 7 successfully completed. The 3 that did not pass failed to retrieve and deliver the rabbit or the duck due to incomplete trained retrieve training.

VGP (Utility Test) 3 successfully completed by the time they were 18 months old. The test measures the finished versatile dog, 26 subjects, over 2 days, across field, forest, water, obedience. The dog must possess a balanced temperament, a lot of natural ability, and a high level of trainability to pass this test) 3 ran and 3 passed, all under 19 months old. Eva was one of those 3.

Health, Coat and Physical Confirmation Evaluations:

Seven of the 10 pups in the litter had their hips x-rayed and ureter evaluated by color doppler.

HIP QUALITY: 7 - "A"

EURETER QUALITY: 7 – "A"

BREED SHOW: 8 where evaluated. 6 were rated "GOOD" or higher and 2 were disqualified because their tail was noticeably too short.

I asked Asco's owner to tell his story with KIM's and his experience with Asco. Below is his reply.

Hi Jim,

I would be happy to answer your questions.

I am 39 years old and was born and raised in Cloppenburg/Stapelfeld, where I still live today. Hunting has been a part of my life from the very beginning. My family has hunted for generations, and I grew up accompanying hunters in the field. I earned my hunting license at the age of 16 and have been an active hunter ever since.

The area where we live and hunt is primarily a small-game region, with hare, rabbits, pheasants, and other upland game species. As a result, most of my hunting with Asco is focused on small game, and we spend a great deal of time together in the field. I am out hunting or training with him almost every day. A few times each year, we also hunt wild boar and deer. Although small game is his main focus, Asco performs exceptionally well on big game too. His work on blood tracks is especially impressive, as he remains calm, focused, and methodical.

Asco is my second hunting dog. Before him, I owned another Small Münsterländer. When I started looking for a new dog, breeding was never part of my plans. My goal was simply to find a reliable hunting companion that would also fit well into our family life.

From the moment Asco came to us in 2018, his exceptional trainability stood out. Even as a young puppy, he was attentive, eager to learn, and seemed to understand very quickly what was expected of him. These qualities remained evident throughout his entire training. As a relatively inexperienced dog trainer, I never encountered any significant difficulties while training him or preparing for the tests. Of course, I also benefited from the guidance and support of Asco's breeder, Josef Germann, who was always willing to share his knowledge and experience.

The VGP was a particularly special experience for me, as I had never before handled a dog in this test. Over the two days of the VGP, Asco delivered a truly outstanding performance. Competing against approximately 50 dogs, he earned 336 points and became the overall test winner. It was a moment I will never forget and one that made me incredibly proud of him.

Since then, Asco has been in regular hunting service, and I can rely on him in every situation. His strong hunting abilities are matched by an outstanding temperament. At home, he is calm, friendly, and easy to live with, making him an exceptional family dog as well. I have three young children, and I never have to worry when they are playing with him. I trust him completely, and he has always shown patience and gentleness around them. He is also very social with other dogs and has never caused any problems.

Looking back, I could not have asked for a better hunting companion or family dog. Asco combines natural hunting ability, intelligence, trainability, and a wonderful character, and I am grateful for everything we have experienced together so far.

This testing provides an invaluable base of knowledge from which we can evaluate and improve our breeding program and the breed as a whole. **It is only through the spirit of cooperation and shared responsibility between the breeder and the owner that continued improvements to the breed can be made.** In order to have a good versatile hunting dog, you can be proud of, this training preparation necessary to successfully complete the field evaluation tests is something you should be doing even if you did not test. Evaluation of the physical structure, coat, hips and ureter provide valuable information about the dog's long-term functionality and capacity to stand up to the rigors of hunting in various terrain, habitat and water. Without the proper physical structure and coat the peak performance longevity of the dog can be greatly limited.

We sell only to hunters who have the interest, understanding and desire to meet our expectations. Those types of owners will reap the benefits by being able to continue to acquire exceptional stable hunting companions that are also good family members. At the same time, they will contribute to future generations of hunters by enabling those future generations to experience the same adventure and joy a field, with a truly acceptable stable hunting partner and companion, that those past generations did!!
